EXERCISE 1 Recognizing Subjects and Verbs

Underline the subject (the simple subject) once and the verb (the simple predicate) twice in each sentence. **Hint:** A sentence may have more than one subject or more than one verb.

EXAMPLE You can improve your grades.

1. Strong study skills can make you more confident.
2. Before each class, successful students review their notes from the previous class.
3. After school, you and a classmate can discuss your notes.
4. Are you a night person or a morning person?
5. Some students do their best work late at night.
6. A quiet place can focus your attention.

Sometimes, the verb comes before the noun.

Example:
